The **Five Pillars of Islam** are the most important beliefs and practice of Islam and those with Muslim worldviews usually try to keep them:

- Shahadah (declaration of one God-Allah- and hi prophet Muhammad (PBUH)
- Zakat (giving)
- Sawm (fasting)
- Salat (prayers)
- Hajj (pilgrimage to Mecca)

Those with Muslim worldviews can learn how to live well from the **Qur'an** (the Muslim holy book). Muslims usually believe that the **Angel Gibril revealed** the Qur'an to **Muhammad** (**PBUH**) and it is **God's word**.

Those with Muslim worldviews often gather at the local **mosque/masjid**.

The **Aqeeqah** is an act of worship many Muslims perform when a baby is born. Meat is usually served and the baby is named.

Those with Muslim worldviews believe in **one God** they refer to as '**Allah**'.

The Qur'an contains **99 Beautiful Names of Allah** that provide insights into what God is like for those with Muslim worldviews. These are often written in beautiful **calligraphy**.

Muslim women and girls might choose to wear a **hijab** but they might not. In the UK they can make their own decisions about clothing. Ramadan is a month of fasting (no food or water during daylight hours) many Muslims choose to undertake for its **spiritual** benefits. At the end of Ramadan, **Eid-al-Fitr** is celebrated.

A common belief amongst those with Muslim worldviews is that only **Allah** is perfect and can create perfectly. Islamic artistic expressions are represented through **calligraphy and geometric patterns.** 

**'Ummah'** is an Arabic word meaning 'community' which is central for many with Muslim worldviews. The **Five Pillars** are different ways those with Muslim worldviews can practice ummah together in service of Allah.

Sawm is about giving and charity and hajj is a special pilgrimage to Mecca.

Tawhid is a term meaning the oneness of God and that there is no God but Allah. KS<sub>3</sub>

Many people with Muslim worldviews **pray 5 times a day.** 

Ibrahim is an important person in Muslim worldviews. Many of the stories in the **Qur'an** and the Bible/Torah are similar.

For many with Muslim worldviews, **Prophet Muhammad** (PBUH) is an inspirational person and through **Sunnah and Hadith** Muslims can learn how to live a good life.

In many Muslim worldviews, the concept of 'heaven' or '**paradise**' is an important part of **life after death**.

ljtihad is an Arabic term meaning 'struggle with reasoning' used to interpret the Qur'an, Hadith and Sunnah
