### Key Facts



1. Christianity is one of the five main world religions. It is based on the teachings of Jesus Christ.
2. Jesus was born a Jew and Christianity originally developed as part of Judaism.
3. The words Christian and Christianity come from the name Jesus Christ.
4. Christians worship in church in different ways e.g. prayer, hymns, songs, reflections and Holy Communion.
5. During church services, Christians have Holy Communion also known as the Eucharist where worshippers have bread and wine to remember The Last Supper.
6. The wine during Holy Communion represents the blood of Christ and the bread represents the body of Christ.
7. Rosa Parks is famous Christian who fought for equality between black and white people in America.
8. The Coventry Cross of Nails was designed as a symbol of peace and reconciliation
